


1. INTRODUCTION & CONTEXT


Young people and housing inequality in Southern Europe, why?

- Portugal, Spain, Italy, and Greece: major changes in housing system.
- 2008 GFC; Troika; homeomership; family; fragile welfare system; financialisation; touristification; changes in Urban Lease Regime....
- Changes in housing among young people in Southern Europe, may lead to intergenerational inequalities Housing inequality (access to housing and the quality of dwellings).
- Housing inequalities a significant global challenge, and limited research & the role that government policies can play.
- Multiple crisis: COVID-19; Wars: Russia-Ukranian and Israel-Hamas; climate crisis; energy crisis.

Multimethod research framework

- Systematic literature review (N=97 n=46)
- Young people and housing policy in Souther Europe (2018-2023) n=97
- SILC microdata (Portugal)

- Theoretical arguments: 1. Labor market and economy; 2. Family, income and social class; 3. Housing market.
- Housing policy developments: Territory (Spain) and Environment, young people and housing policy (Italy, Greece); Homeownership; Rental. Financialization; help to buy upper classes
- Variables: 1) Owners; 2) Renters; 3)
 Adults 25 years old or older coresident, living in the lineal relatives' house.

- Semi-structure Interviews, Generation Z (18-27 years old (housing trajectories, future prospects, family resources, labour market transitions, housing market)
- Focus groups
- Deliberative foruns

3.1 Search conducted in the electronic databases

Records identified through databases prior to Identification deduplication n = 448Scopus (263) and Web of Science (185) Excluded from review n = 110Records after applying eligibility criteria n = 338Duplicates remove n = 204Screened by title, abstract and keywords n = 134Further excluded n = 88Literature included in the literature review n = 4640 articles, 1 book and 5 book chapters



3. PRELIMINARY FINDINGS

- Portugal: developments in youth housing policy in 2024
- Promoting Youth Housing
- Public Guarantee for Young People: Enable young people to obtain bank financing for the purchase of their first home.
- Exemption from IMT and Stamp Duty: Grant exemptions from IMT (Municipal Property Transfer Tax) and Stamp Duty for young people up to 35 years old when purchasing their first home (up to 316,000€).
- Reform of the "Porta 65": Remove exclusions based on rent limits.
- Emergency Program for Student Housing: Implement the "National Housing Plan 2025-26" to provide students with an additional 18,000 beds.
- POSSIBLE IMPACT: incresse housing inequality


